## Stewardship Examples



Let's look at some good examples - maybe you already thought of some of these!

#### At Home:

- Get a bucket or container with a lid to collect food scraps in. Take the scraps out to the Green Waste Can (Binny!) to be made into compost, instead of sending to the landfill in the trash. You'll be helping keep Greenhouse Gases like methane out of the air!
- Ask your family if they can help you get and plant Native Habitat plants that attract wildlife, like butterflies and birds (pollinators).
- Create a wildlife habitat put out a flat dish of water, make a brush pile of sticks for shelter, make a bird feeder.
- Do a water leak patrol and check all of your family's sinks, toilets, showers, tubs, and hose bibs to make sure that they are not dripping or leaking water. Remind your family to always turn off water when not using it. Help make sure that all dish and clothes washing machines are full before running them. You will conserve water by running fewer loads.
- Put a bucket in the shower to collect cold water as it warms up. Use that water in the toilet tank when you flush, or water your plants with it.

#### In Parks:

- If you are bringing your dog, keep him/her on a leash and bring your pooper scooper bags to prevent the spread of bacteria.
- You know the importance of Leave No Trace:
   packing out what you pack in. This means any
   trash you produce on the trail needs to go back
   into a backpack or pocket and put in a trash or
   recycling can. As you are hiking or walking a trail,
   stay on the trail. Leave wildflowers to make seeds
   for next year. Observe wildlife quietly and don't
   scare or bother them.

#### In The Community:

- Pick up trash and recycling objects that are on the sidewalks, put them in a bag, and dispose of them in the proper can.
- If you have a dog, bring a Poop bag whenever you walk him/her. Scoop the poop into the bag and be sure to put it in the trash. Afterwards, wash your hands and use hand sanitizer.
- Ask your parent if you can go places on a bicycle instead of driving in a car. You'll conserve our clean air, and reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions that cause Global Climate Change while you are getting good exercise and having fun!



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## WHAT IS A STEWARD?

A steward is someone who takes care of something precious and valuable. For example, you might be a Steward of things at home, like your toys, your computer, your bedroom, or a pet. You have been learning about something really precious and valuable outdoors - Nature!



## What are some of the things that you experience in Nature that you want to help take care of?

Preserving open space and agricultural land is part of TVC's job of Stewardship - taking care of the land. Tri-Valley Conservancy's purpose is simple: protecting open space for you, wildlife, native plants, trees, and future generations to enjoy. Open space is simply land that is free from development like buildings and houses.

Open spaces frequently seen in Livermore are for agriculture, recreation, and conservation. Sometimes we can't visit this open land directly because it is being used for growing crops (like grapes), or cattle grazing, or even to conserve (protect) a certain plant or animal species. But we are able to still enjoy looking upon our scenic open spaces that have trees, grassy hillsides, or vineyards.

## WHAT ARE OPEN SPACES?

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Our recreational open spaces are the spaces we are directly able to use like parks and trails. It's important to protect these spaces for not only our own health and enjoyment, but also for the benefit of all the future people, plants, and wildlife that will live in this area after us.
